



There will be NO Preschool on Wednesday, May 10. We will be getting ready for their Educational Journey Celebration (Graduation).



#### "SUMMER SLIDE"

while better off children build their skills steadily over the summer months.



#### SUMMER LEARNING LOSS

#### Summer School

Santee Community School will be offering summer school. Dates for summer school are June 5 through June 29, and then July 10 through August 3, 2017. The hours will be 9:00 a.m. to 2:00 p.m. for grades K – 5. This year's theme for the K- 5 students will be "Summer Has a Whole New Story - Santee LitCamp".

Students in grades 6 – 8 will also be able to attend summer school. The students in these grades will be working on skills that will help them transition into middle school and high school.

Credit Recovery will be offered for high school students from 8:30 a.m. – 12:30 p.m.

Children that will be entering Kindergarten this fall are eligible to attend summer school.

Summer school is open to all children that live in the Santee School district.

Breakfast will be served from 8:30 – 9:00 a.m. Lunch will be served from 12:00 – 12:30 p.m. All students ages 0 - 18 can eat free at the school.

#### Open Library

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#### Notice of Destruction of Special Education Records

April 26, 2017

#### Attention Parents/Guardians, Former Students, Eligible (Adult) Students:

Special Education records, which have been collected by the Santee Community School District related to the identification, evaluation, educational placement, or the provision of Special Education in the district, must be maintained under state and federal laws for a period of five years after Special Education services have ended for the student. Special Education services end when the student is no longer eligible for services, graduates, completes his or her educational program at age 21, or moves from the district.

This notification is to inform parents/guardians and former students of Santee Community School's intent to destroy the Special Education records of students who are no longer receiving Special Education services for at least five (5) years beyond the age of twenty-one (21). This includes records for individuals whose year of birth is 1991 or earlier. It also included students who graduated high school in 2012 or earlier. The records will be destroyed in accordance with state law unless the parent/guardian or eligible (adult) student notifies the school district otherwise.

After five years, the records are no longer useful to the district, but they may be useful to the parent/guardian or former student in applying for Social Security benefits, rehabilitation services, college entrance, etc. The parent/guardian or eligible (adult) student may request a copy of the records in writing or in person at the following address:










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#### **High School Social Studies ~ Ms. Jurries**
