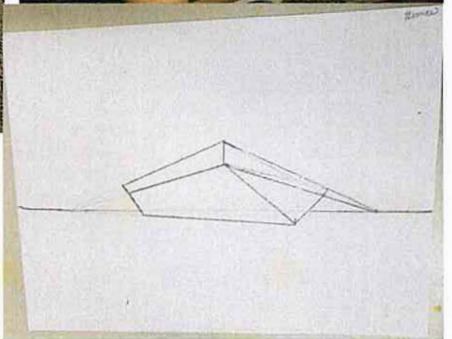
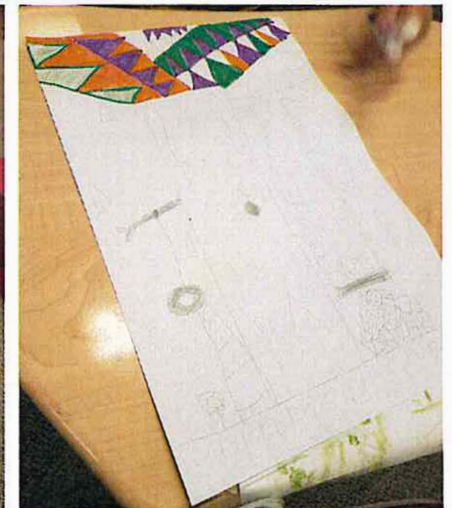
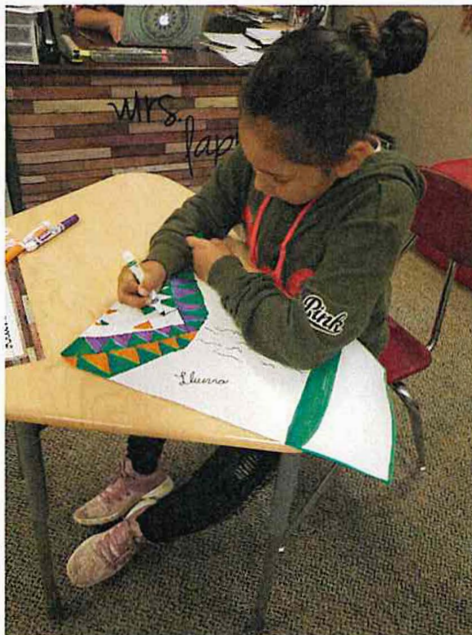
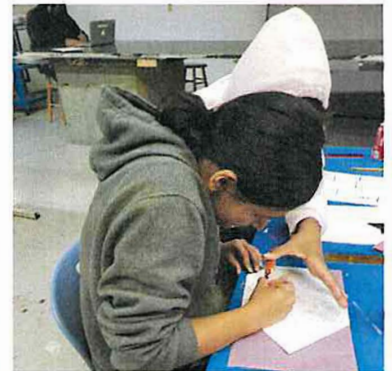
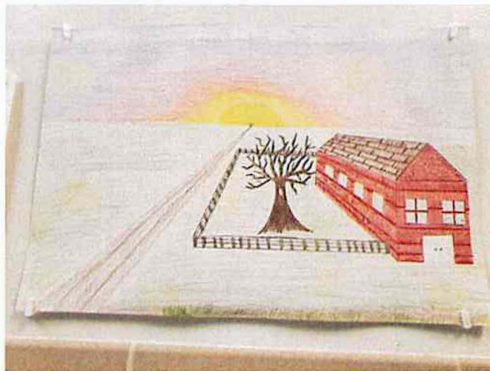


Hello!

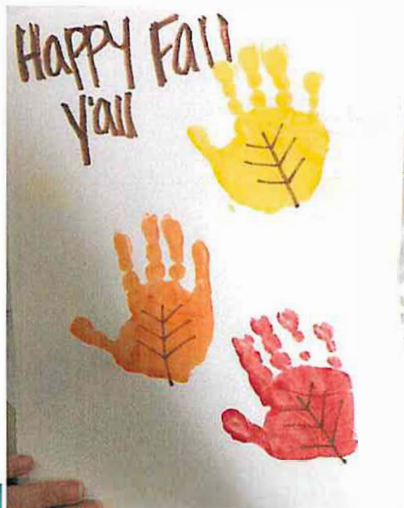

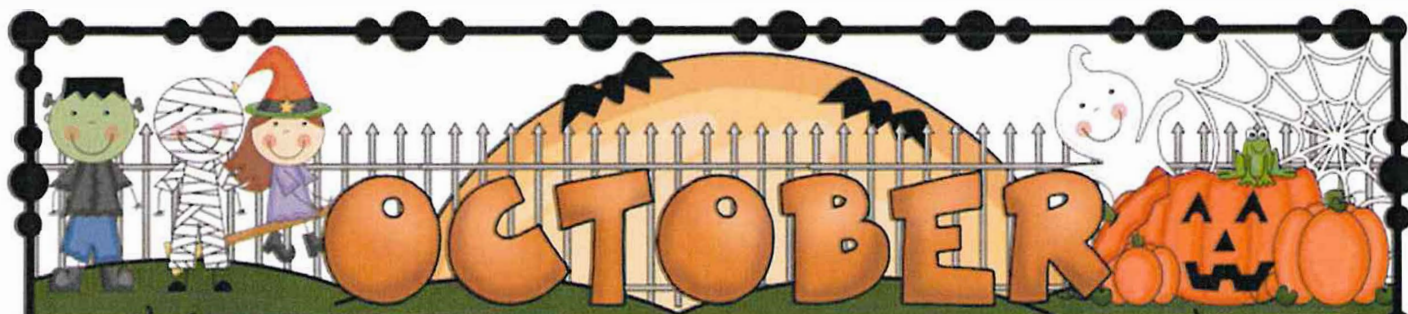

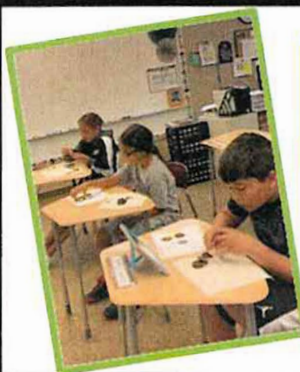

- ☐ Coordinate dorm purchases with your roommate.



Scholarship Information Sheet

Tips for finding scholarships

- Start looking in the spring of your junior year.
- Organize scholarships in deadline order, and set aside time each week to work on scholarship essays and applications.
- If requested on the application, list activities, awards, honors classes, and volunteer or paid jobs. Track them using the *Activities Resume* at [EducationQuest.org](https://www.educationquest.org).
- If an application requires a letter of recommendation, give the person writing the letter sufficient notice, a specific deadline, and a copy of your *Activities Resume*.
- After writing an essay, ask an adult (preferably an English teacher) to review the document for spelling, grammar, and sentence structure.
- Follow all directions, and make sure the application is complete and submitted by the deadline or it will be disqualified.
- *Never* pay for scholarship services! Talk to your school counselor or contact EducationQuest about the many free options available.

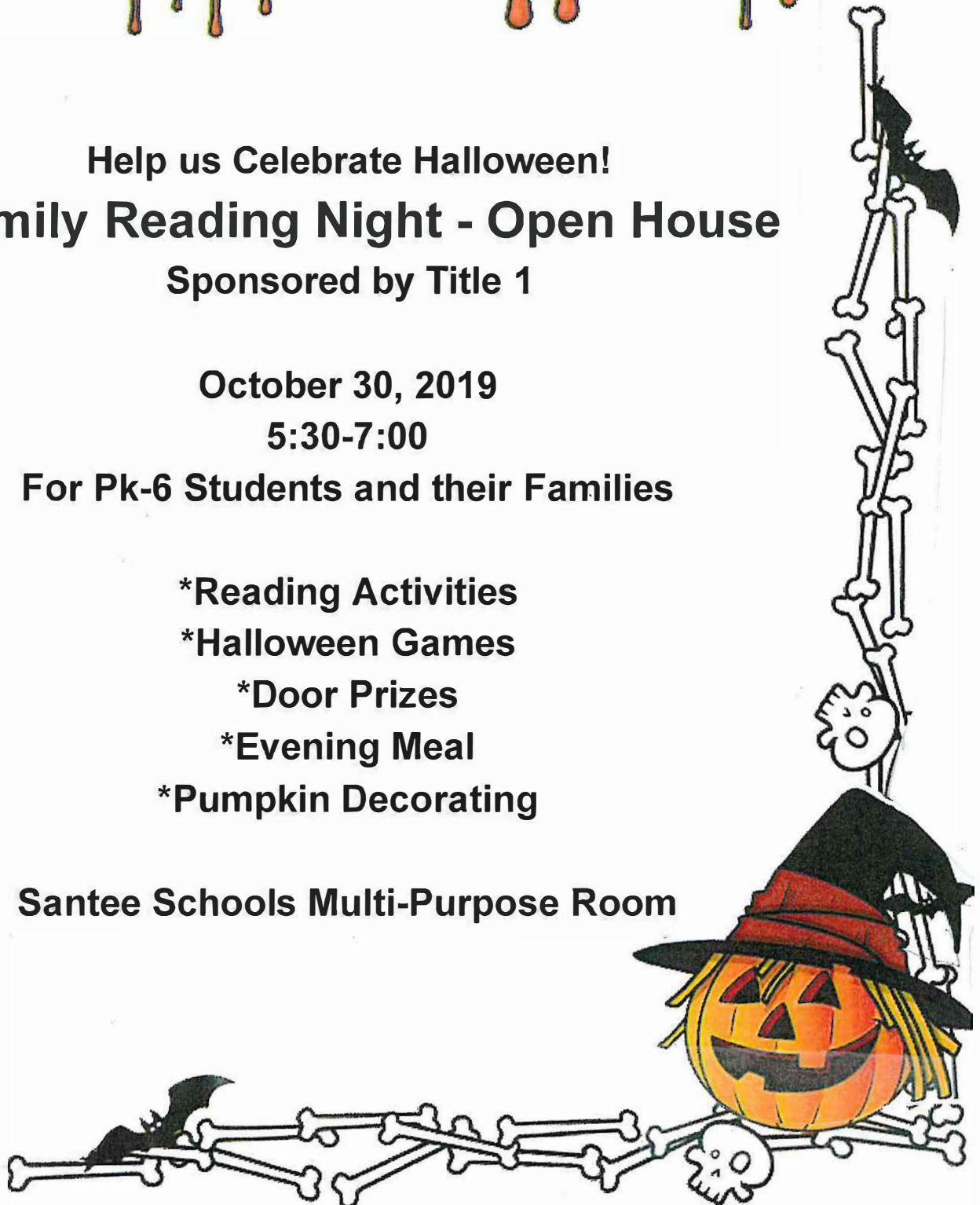

How to Pay for College

Follow these steps to apply for federal financial aid and scholarships:



Step 1. Apply for scholarships.

Step 1: Research colleges.

Start by asking your school counselor for college-search advice and resources. Here are other things you can do:

- Learn about the [types of colleges and their degrees](#).
- Talk to admission representatives when they visit your high school.
- Attend a College Fair or Educational Planning Program where you can talk to college representatives.
- Use our [College Profiles](#) to match colleges with your interests.
 - Another good resource is [BigFuture](#) from the College Board.
- Explore the websites of colleges that interest you.

Step 2: Go on campus visits.

This is the most important step you can take to determine if a school is the right fit for you!

- Start your visits in the spring of your junior year and revisit your top choices in the fall of your senior year.
- Contact the admissions office at least two weeks in advance to schedule a campus visit.
- Visit while school is in session. You won't get the full campus experience during school breaks, finals week, or summer.
- Meet with an admissions representative and financial aid counselor to discuss how to apply and pay for college.
- Ask to meet with faculty in your areas of interest.
- [Ask a lot of questions!](#)

Step 3. Narrow your college choices.

Now that you've done your research and gone on campus visits, it's time to compare notes and pick your top college choices. Compare schools based on academic programs, size, location, career preparation, internships, and social climate.

Step 4. Take college entrance exams.

You'll take the ACT in the spring of your junior year, and you may want to take the SAT as well. Retake the exam(s) in the summer and fall – colleges will use your best score for scholarship and admission decisions.

If you attend a community college, you may be required to take the Accuplacer or Companion placement tests.

Step 5. Apply for admission.

Be aware of deadlines and apply to your top 3-4 colleges in the fall of your senior year. Most will require:

- The application and fee
- Official high school transcripts which will show:
 - Your grade point average and class rank
 - That you completed high school coursework
- ACT/SAT test scores

If your school conducts an *Apply2College* event, you'll get help with your applications during the school day. If not, use our [college application checklist](#) and other resources in the sidebar.

Step 6: Select a college.

In the spring of your senior year, compare your top colleges and make your final decision. Then, complete these tasks:

- Sign up for your college's online student account or portal.
- Submit the application form and deposit for campus housing.
- Register for new-student orientation.
- Notify the other schools of your decision and decline their awards.
- Apply for student and/or parent loans, if needed.



Wondering how to get started on the college application process? No worries! Many Nebraska high schools are holding events this fall to help you apply to college.

Even if your school isn't conducting an *Apply2College* event, EducationQuest has free resources to help you complete applications. Here's how to get started:

1. **Narrow your college choices to 3 or 4** by visiting with college representatives at [College Fairs](#), [Educational Planning Programs](#), during campus visits, and when they visit your high school.

Types of Financial Aid

These are four types of financial aid to help you pay for college.



Scholarships are awarded by private donors or your college. Some are based on financial need while others are based on criteria such as academics, leadership, athletics, or talents.

Grants* are awarded to students who show financial need and are not repaid. They include:

- Pell Grant
- Supplemental Educational Opportunity Grant (SEOG)
- Nebraska State Opportunity Grant
- College-based grants

Work-Study,* also based on financial need, is money you earn from a college-based job to help pay for school expenses.

Student Loans* are money you borrow and must repay after you're done with college. Loans are also available for parents. See our [loan chart](#) for details.

**These types of financial aid are based on FAFSA results.*
