We are busy with **academic hearing** informing students and parents what is required to meet the graduation requirements and where each student is in regard to meeting these requirements. Remember that once a student is in 9th grade, all classes count toward graduation.

Please check the status of your student's progress at school often. Any courses failed will need to be made up. Each class passed is worth 10 credits. 270 credits are required for graduation.

The Santee Sioux Tribe and Santee Community School have partnered to add a School Resource Officer (SRO) and Cultural Specialist. We want to welcome Natalie Torrez and Redwing Thomas to these positions and for supporting our students. You may have already been in contact with our SRO if your child has truancy issues. Remember that Truancy is illegal. **Attendance in school** is mandatory until your child has either graduated or turned 21 years of age. Tribal code will be enforced regarding truancy. If you have any questions, please contact the school. We will help and support wherever we can to ensure your child's attendance at school.

We have also **completed our Winter NWEA MAP** testing. I would like to report that many students met and exceeded their test goals. We saw some great gains in many students and look to have more improved results this spring. Congratulations to our students for their efforts. Thanks to our staff for helping to prepare our students for this success.

Finally, when you **look at your child's grades**, if you notice they have and incomplete (INC) grade, they are to attend 9th hour after school to finish their incomplete work. This is an opportunity for students to complete work and get caught up. This is also helping students to pass classes and thus add to their credits toward graduation.

NEW...Welcome, Student Resource Officer-SCS/SSN

Dear Student and parents of Santee Community School:

Greetings. I am writing to inform you that I, Natalie Torrez, am the Student Resource Officer of the Santee Community School also known as Truancy Officer of the Santee Sioux Nation.

With this position I will be managing the Truancy Diversion Project as Truancy Officer approved and provided by the Santee Sioux Nation. This means I will handling all Truancy matters within the Santee Community School in collaboration with the Santee Sioux Nation, the Dakota Tiwahe Service Unit (DTSU), Tribal Courts, and Santee Police Department. I will be the liaison between all of these Departments working together for a successful school year for you and your child/children.

Please know that as a collaborative group effort we will strive to help you, the parent with any Truancy issues. We are not trying to work against you in any way possible. For continuation and funding purposes this job was created to help Santee Community School keep your child in school for the attainment of their High School Diploma, preparing them to be more successful adults. As we all know, the children are our future, and to help them along the way to be successful adults we ALL need to work in collaboration with each other to be in school as much as possible, for the best outcome of your child/children today.

Since 2009 the Santee Sioux Nation has their own laws and regulations as a Sovereign Nation, which included laws against Truancy under Compulsory Education. It states that "Mandatory Attendance" at a State and/or Federally funded school is required for children age 6-18 years or until the child has obtained their High School Diploma or has completed the program of instruction offered by the school which elects not to meet the accreditation or approval requirements pursuant to the laws of the jurisdiction where it is located.

In regards to Truancy for Students and parents/caregivers, you can legally be charged and prosecuted for failure to send your child/children to school with penalties to include fines, jail time, and/or both, to the extent of determining the family is "in need of services" which opens up a broader and more defined case for possible child removal and placement where the Santee Sioux Nation deems fit.

As Truancy Officer for the Santee Sioux Nation, I hope to help you as a parent and student with resources and education to avoid prosecution and/or child removal by a set of standards and procedures to get your child to school and become a positive and healthy contributing member of or our Nation and society as a whole. We will incorporate this through Truancy Diversion Project and meet monthly to discuss ways to increase your child's attendance.

Thank you for your time and consideration to this matter. Please don't hesitate to contact me at Santee Community School if you should have any questions, comments or concerns regarding Truancy Law, and how it affects you, your child and/or family. I will be more than willing to help you and your child make it through this endeavor, because like you I am a parent, and believe the children are our future, and it is our job to get them there so that they will be here to take care of us as we get older. Ways to Support Learning at Home

Sick kids should stay home from school if they have a fever, are nauseated, vomiting, or have diarrhea. Kids



who lose their appetite, are clingy or lethargic, complain of pain, or who just don't seem to be acting "themselves" should also take a sick day.

Otherwise, it's important that kids arrive at school on time every day, because having to catch up with class work and homework can be stressful and interfere with learning.

If your child is missing a lot of school due to illness, make sure to check with the teacher about any work that needs to be completed. It's also a good idea to know the school's attendance policy.

Sometimes students want to stay home from school because of problems with classmates, assignments or grades, or even teachers. This can result in real symptoms, like headaches or stomachaches. If you think there's a problem at school, talk with your child — and then perhaps with the

teacher — to find out more about what's causing the anxiety. The school counselor or school psychologist also might be able to help.

Also try to avoid late bedtimes, which can result in tardy and tired students. A consistent sleep schedule can help.

Make Time to Talk About School

It's usually easy to talk with elementary students about what's going on in class and the latest news at school. You probably know what books your child is reading and are familiar with the math being worked on. But parents can get busy and forget to ask the simple questions, which can have an effect on children's success at school.

Make time to talk with your child every day, so he or she knows that what goes on at school is important to you. When kids know parents are interested in their academic lives, they'll take school seriously as well.

Because communication is a two-way street, the way you talk and listen to your child can influence how well your child listens and responds. It's important to listen carefully, make eye contact, and avoid multitasking while you chat. Be sure to ask questions that go beyond "yes" or "no" answers.

Besides during family meals, good times to talk include car trips (though eye contact isn't needed here, of course), walking the dog, preparing meals, or standing in line at a store.

These early years of schooling are an important time for parents to be informed and supportive about their child's education.

School Guidelines include:

A student is sent home with a fever 100.5 or higher, vomiting, or diarrhea, needs to stay home until they are fever free and free from vomiting and diarrhea for 24hours.

If your child has been sick at home, do not send to school until they have been fever free for 24hours without taking fever reducing medicines (Tylenol or Ibuprofen) and have not had vomiting or diarrhea for 24 hours.

Please **remember to keep the Office Staff updated on student illness** so that we can track the number of kids out ill and tell us the symptoms they have or the diagnosis the Doctor gave them.

Child subjected to abuse or neglect

School employees are <u>MANDATORY REPORTER</u>

When any Human Services school employee has **reasonable cause** to believe that a child has been subjected to child abuse or neglect or observes such child being subjected to conditions or circumstances which reasonably would result in child abuse or neglect, he or she shall report such incident to the proper law enforcement agency or the Nebraska Department of Health and .

Sexual Abuse - Statutory Rape

What is the Nebraska Age of Consent?

The Nebraska Age of Consent is 16 years old. The age of consent is the minimum age at which an individual is considered legally old enough to consent to participation in sexual activity. Individuals aged 15 or younger in Nebraska are not legally able to consent to sexual activity, and such activity may result in prosecution for statutory rape.

Nebraska statutory rape law is violated when a person has consensual sexual intercourse with an individual under age 16. It is considered statutory rape, **regardless** of whether or not it was consensual. It is a criminal act and can be criminally prosecuted. The individual whose age is below the age of consent is considered to be the victim, and their sexual partner whose age exceeds the age of consent is seen as the offender.

Nebraska does not have a close-in-age exemption. Close in age exemptions, commonly known as "Romeo and Juliet laws", are put in place to prevent the prosecution of individuals who engage in consensual sexual activity when both participants are significantly close in age to each other, and one or both partners are below the age of consent.

Because there is no such "Romeo and Juliet law" in Nebraska, it is possible for two individuals both under the age of 16 who willingly engage in intercourse to both be prosecuted for statutory rape, although this is rare. Similarly, no protections are reserved for sexual relations in which one participant is a 15 year old and the second is **over** the age of 16 year old.

Statutory rape is not the same as rape. The key difference between statutory rape and rape is that the only deciding factor between legal sexual activity and statutory rape is age.
