
As a staff, we are all working hard to ensure that our students have access to the best possible educational experiences, whether that be our new STEM Lab or our career and technical education experiences.



Welcome to our jungle!








Kindergarten sure has been busy this year! The students have been having so much fun creating art to help decorate our jungle.

Elementary STEM Lab












ELEMENTARY STEM LAB







Greetings, Santee Community! Thank you all for such a warm welcome into my first year here. I am quickly getting a handle on names and personalities as I approach some major goals for my students this year.

Freshmen are beginning to learn the history of the novella with a Steinbeck favorite, "The Pearl." This novel introduces the importance of community building and moral action and I am looking forward to our meaningful discussions along the way.

Sophomores are beginning with a longer text, "The Book Thief," as we discuss the importance of our role in humanity. I intend to work with these students on their reading skills as well as their ability to interpret a deeper meaning behind this historical text.

Juniors are already hard at work with their introduction speeches. They're learning the format of a speech along with the strategies and techniques necessary for public speaking. Soon, we'll be preparing for the ACT Writing portion of the ACT they'll be taking this spring. We'll work on format and practice with examples so that this spring is just a review for the real thing.

Seniors are preparing for their life after high school. We started the year out by prepping our resume and discussing career options. Next, we'll dive into some British Literature and study the romance and history of "Romeo and Juliet."

My creative writing course is a small group and they're beginning to open up with their writing skills. We agreed that the short story would be a great unit to start with, so we've started the year out by reading and answering prompts together. We'll continue in this way as we evolve into other genres of writing including poetry, critical analysis, and graphic novels.

Drama is a new course for me this year. I'm very excited to be working with this variety of students as they have already shown a willingness to connect and understand the deeper meaning and motivation of plays. We will study a number of plays including "Fences" by August Wilson and "A Doll's House" by Henrik Ibsen. My hope is to take these students to several plays this year and potentially, we may develop our own one-act play for the community.


I appreciate the opportunity I have teaching here and look forward to a wonderful year!



New to 2018-19 introducing

Career and Technical Education

Career and technical education (CTE) is the practice of teaching specific career skills to students in middle school and high school. This year Santee Community school will begin to focus on a new path for students.



Here are ten quick facts about CTE

7.4 million secondary students and 4 million post-secondary students are <u>interested in</u>

<u>CTE nationwide</u>

93% of CTE students graduate high school, which is 10% higher than average

78% of CTE graduates enroll in post-secondary education full-time

Between 2012 and 2022, there will be 50,557,900 job openings for CTE graduates

Students enrolling in post-secondary CTE courses are eligible for federal financial aid

CTE students are 50% less likely to drop out than non-CTE students

81% of high school dropouts say real-world skills education would've kept them in school

For every \$1 of government funding in CTE, taxpayers earn as much as \$12.20 in benefits in return

Technical and applied science graduates earn \$2,000 to \$11,000 more per year than those with a bachelor's degree

Hello! My name is Jason Folkers and I am the Elementary Guidance Counselor here at Santee Community
Schools. This is my first year in this position, but my 2nd year here at Santee. I really enjoy the kids, culture, and staff
that has been introduced to me so far here in Santee. It really feels like home.

• This year we are implementing a program called Second Step to grades Kindergarten-6th, and I will be the person instructing the students.

Second Step is a program rooted in social-emotional learning (SEL) that helps transform schools into supportive, successful learning environments uniquely equipped to encourage children to thrive. More than just a classroom curriculum, Second Step's holistic approach helps create a more empathetic society by providing education professionals, families, and the larger community with tools to enable them to take an active role in the social-emotional growth and safety of today's children. It's a difference you can feel the moment you step through the doors to a Second Step

school: a sense of safety and respect grounded in the social-emotional health and well-being of the entire school community.

Periodically I will be sending things home that you can do with your children. It is not homework, and it is not meant to be challenging. It is more of a check and connect with your children to see what they are learning that week and if they can give examples. From the Ag Classes

Have you seen the white flowers waving over trees and fence lines? Do you recognize this scene?







If so, you are not the only ones.

The plant studies class is making the most of the good weather by exploring the outside and observing the woodland flora. The class decided to see how long the vine clinging to the tree was.

It was a struggle getting the vine off because it had had tied itself up in the branches. Wild cucumbers have tendrils or slender structures that curl around anything they touch. The vine was over 40 feet long!

Back in the classroom, the students Identified the vine as the Wild Cucumber.

Wild Cucumber (Echinocystis lobata) is a member of the cucumber or gourd family, the Cucurbitaceae. There are both male and female flowers. The female flowers stay close to the stem. The male flowers try to reach the sky. They are the ones that give the vine the white frosted look. One plant can cover a whole tree and weigh 150 pounds.



Each year there is a plant that grows more than normal. This year it is the Wild Cucumber. Watch as you drive down the road watch for the white male flowers waving in the wind.

Report to PARENTS

Make Every Day Count: Boost School Attendance

o stay on track in school, students need to be present every day. Missing 18 or more days of school in a year puts a child's high school graduation at risk, according to AbsencesAddUp.org, a national chronic absenteeism prevention campaign. Being absent for just two days every month of the school year can put a child behind academically.

Students with regular attendance are more likely to read well by third grade and score higher on tests. They also tend to be more engaged in school and feel better about themselves.

Put your child on the path to success with these attendance strategies.

Make school a priority. Every absence (excused or not), can impact a child's academic achievement. Talk to your child about how important their education is. Make daily routines for homework and waking up on time for school.

Maintain communication with teachers and keep an eye on your child's academic progress. If your child seems disconnected from school or is prone

to skipping class, try signing him or her up for an after-school activity. A report by the University of Minnesota found that students in an after-school program attended 18 more days of school and missed nine fewer than their peers.

Make a plan. If your schedule or transportation situation makes getting your child to school a challenge, ask for assistance. Make a carpool or transportation plan with other parents or family members, or ask your school principal for community programs or school initiatives that may help.

Report In. Know your school's attendance policies. If an absence or early dismissal is unavoidable, contact your school. If your family's religious observances fall on school days, let teachers know early in the year which days your child will miss.

Carefully weigh sick days. If your child is sick, talk with your health care provider to determine whether they should stay home from school. If the doctor or nurse recommends that your child stay home, find out exactly how long and on what conditions he or she can return to class (for example, after 24 hours of antibiotics).

Before keeping your children home, make sure they aren't faking symptoms. Regularly feigning sickness may be a sign that your child is anxious about facing a challenge at school,

such as bullying.

Schedule wisely. Know your school's calendar, and arrange doctor and dentist appointments after school, on weekends, or during holiday breaks, if possible. Resist the urge to schedule vacations when students will miss school. This gives students the impression that school is not a priority.

Help students complete assignments. When your child has to miss school, make arrangements with teachers

to pick up a packet of make-up work. Ensure that your child follows through, and be available to explain concepts or monitor their work. If your child's absence will be lengthy (for surgery, for instance), alert teachers as soon as you know and pick up assignments as the days go on.

Greetings Parents/Guardians of Santee Community School:

I am writing to inform you that the Truancy Diversion Project is up and running again this year. I meet with Parents/Guardians and the Student on a Bi-Weekly basis when TRUANCY starts to develop, and we work together to DIVERT the attendance issue to a positive attendance without issue. I am excited this school year to be working with you and your child(ren). Please know that I am here as a resource to help you and your family stay out of Tribal Courts and our Social Service Program (DTSU). This requires us to work together throughout this school year to improve our overall Daily Attendance Rate, increase student growth, and achieve our goal for our children to Graduate High School.

Many Positive changes are coming our way in regards to our collaboration efforts with the Santee Health Center, Santee Sioux Nation Tribal Courts, the Dakota Tiwahe Service Unit and Santee Law Enforcement to curb the current Truancy Issues we face today.

Please note and remember the following information as tips and guides to stay out of Tribal Court and Truancy Diversion Program:

- Make sure your child attends school EVERYDAY school is in session and that your child is on time to school/class.
- ➢ Bring in all documentation as it is provided to you to Excuse your child's absence. *(I will only accept Dr. Notes up to 10 Business days after the appointment, any longer than that, if no note is provided to the front office personnel then they can NOT go back and have the absence changed from Unexcused to Excused.)
- ➤ Please make sure you READ the student and parent HANDBOOK. ALL attendance information is in it as it relates to Eligibility and participation in after school activities and Truancy.
- Please KNOW and remember that the ONLY allowable EXCUSE for absences are for Medical appointments of the child and Funeral Leave for members of your child's IMMEDIATE Family.

Cultural activities (i.e. Pow-Wow's, Horse Rides, Ceremonies, etc.) are NOT an ALLOWABLE Excuse according to the Compulsory Education Code of the Santee Sioux Nation, and will NO longer be granted so. Cultural activities usually happen when school is NOT in session and is considered a Privilege to participate in, so if you plan on attending such activities; it would be nice to plan ahead and maybe save your absences for such an occasion, i.e. The 38+2 Honoring Horse Ride that takes place in December, if your child is at 8 total absences for the semester and the ride requires your child to be gone for 5 more days, this makes your child Truant and possible charges filed against you and the child for exceeding the maximum allowable days to be absent for the semester. Therefore, either your child does not go or you justify the absence in front of the Judge.

Please note that I really wish you and your child a successful year in all of their educational and future endeavors. The Truancy Diversion Program should be viewed and utilized as a resource to help your child be successful in their educational journey in hopes of being a self-sufficient productive member of OUR society.

Please don't hesitate to contact me if you should have any questions, comments or concerns regarding the Compulsory Education Code, Truancy Diversion Project, Attendance Policies and Requirements. Thank you.

Dear Parents or Guardians,

North Central District Health Department (NCDHD) and your school are partnering together to bring additional dental health services to your elementary and middle school students through our *Miles of Smiles* program. These services will be available at your school on <u>Wednesday September 26th</u>, 2018.

After five years of *Miles of Smiles* being offered at your school, Santee Elementary School has been selected to participate in a dental sealant program. Public Health Authorized Registered Dental Hygienists will conduct a dental screening; apply fluoride varnish treatment and sealants if needed. Sealants are a thin plastic coating placed on the chewing surfaces of teeth to prevent cavities.

- If your child has Kids Connection/Medicaid or private dental insurance, we will be billing for these services. Please include your insurance information on the back of this page.
- If your child does not have dental insurance, a \$15.00 donation is appreciated. However, if you are
 unable to pay, your child will not be refused service.

Children participating in *Miles of Smiles* will also receive a free toothbrush and toothpaste. A note will be sent home with your child to let you know what was done during the visit. This service does not replace regular checkups by your family dentist. Your child should receive a complete dental exam from his or her dentist at least once a year.
